## The Seven Core Principles of Biblical Wealth and Giving

1. Everything we own belongs to Everything
The Earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it (Psalm 24:1)
"The land is Mine and you reside in My land as foreigners and strangers." (Leviticus 25:23)
Yours, Lord, is the greatness and the power and the glory and the majesty and the splendor, for everything in Heaven and Earth is Yours. Yours, Lord, is the Kingdom; You are exalted as head over all. Wealth and hono come from You; You are the ruler of all things. In Your hands are strength and power to exalt and give strength to all. (1 Chronicles 29:11-12)
Steward: Someone that an owner entrusts with the management of their possessions
2. Our wealth and possessions should be used for God's "Who then is the faithful and wise manager, whom the Master puts in charge of His servants to give them their food allowance at the proper time? It will be good for that servant whom the Master finds doing so when He returns." (Luke 12:42-43)
Stewardship includes how we spend the money, time, and giftings that we have from day to day and doing slooking through the lens of furthering God's Kingdom.
3. Wealth is like, with great potential for both good and harm "For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil." (1 Timothy 6:10)
4. Worldly wealth is; Heavenly treasure is eternal "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on Earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in Heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal." (Matthew 6:19-21)

5. Giving generously to the poor is a duty in a fallen world



"There will always be poor people in the land. Therefore I command you to be openhanded toward your fellow Israelites who are poor and needy in your land." (Deuteronomy 15:11)

When we fail to help those who are poor around us, it is an indication that we don't really know God as well as we claim to. should be voluntary, generous (even sacrificial), cheerful, and needs based "Now about the collection for the Lord's people: Do what I told the Galatian churches to do. On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made. Then, when I arrive, I will give letters of introduction to the men you approve and send them with your gift to Jerusalem." (1 Corinthians 16:1-3) Our Giving To God and His Purposes Should Be... 1. Periodic 2. Planned 3. Proportional 4. Private Tithe: 10% given back to God, which is a good starting point for our giving as we build up from there 7. Giving generously the power of money over us "Whoever loves money never has enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with their income."
